What is a vaccine?



Vaccines protect you and other people from catching viruses and diseases.

Things like the flu.



There is now a vaccine for coronavirus.



People who have Down's syndrome will be offered a vaccine soon.



This is because people who have Down's syndrome are at risk of being very ill from coronavirus.

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What happens when you are given a vaccine?



Normally you are given a vaccine by injection.



3 weeks

A trained person will do this.

You will need to go back twelve weeks later for a second injection.



Your arm may get sore for a little while.

The Government and NHS say that this vaccine is safe.



Having a vaccine is your choice.



If you are not sure or worried. You can talk to someone about it.

Washing your hands.


Wearing a mask.
