A c) The Internet is most like an empty box! Anyone can put anything inside it, and it doesn't check if it is good or bad, true or false, fact or fiction. For example, anyone can create a website and put it on the Internet for everyone to see, so we must not switch off our brain and simply believe what we see or read. We need to check if the information is good or bad, true or false, fact or fiction. We can do this by, asking a friend or family member about what we have seen or read, check in a book or go to at least 3 other websites to see if they say the same thing.

How to spot Fake News

If you want to try to make sure that you don't get caught out by fake news, there a few things you can look out for.

Ask yourself:

Is it on the radio, TV or in the newspapers? Has the story been reported anywhere else?

Does the photo/video look normal?

Have you heard of the organization that published the story? Does the website address at the top look real?

Does the story sound believable?

If the answer to any of these questions is no, you might want to check it out a bit more before spreading the word
